## IF YOU DIDN'T ALREADY HEAR:

After receiving legal clarification from our lawyer for some Park concerns, the Executive has decided on the following procedures:

Members for whom we have missing deeds in our files do NOT need to locate their deeds for us to photocopy, as was previously requested.

Two Executive Board members have gone to the County Courthouse records and made copies of any missing deed information.

Lot owners who have previously shown proof of age are NOT required to re-show proof of age for the Park census.

To remain a designated 55+ Park, at least one person occupying the lot and whose name is on the deed must be 55 or older.

If proof of that has been previously established for a lot, and providing nothing has changed (regarding occupancy and/or names on the deed), then that will continue to suffice.

**New owners** who have not yet provided that proof of age are reminded they must do so.

Renters must also provide proof of age.

In summary, (most) members do not have to bring the requested deed info to the office, nor have to prove that they're getting older!

# TRAVEL HUMOR

[Ed note: I do not recall if someone once told me this story about themselves, or if I read it many, many years ago somewhere - perhaps in a Reader's Digest.

The story is a personal favorite, and I'm reminded of it every time I see certain Holiday decorations.]

It concerns a 7 or 8 year-old boy who was visiting his grandparents for the Holidays, and was "dragged off" to their quiet little country church for a Christmas Eve Service

The Church would be packed for the occasion, and the boy was squeezed in between his grandmother and the end of the pew. Every second row of pews had their armrests decorated with a festive arrangement of holly, white satin balls and a huge red bow. The boy was disappointed that his pew's armrest was one of the ones not decorated.

The boy had apparently never seen holly before, and its leaves with "all the pointy edges" immediately grabbed his interest. He wondered what that strange leaf felt like. He moved forward in his seat and stretched his arm towards the decoration on the pew ahead. But before he could investigate this strange leaf cluster, his Granny quickly grabbed his arm away and told him not to touch anything.

She passed the boy a hymnal to keep his hands busy. He turned page after page, feigning interest in the songbook while the corner of his eye kept staring at the strange leaves in that decorative cluster just an arm's stretch away. What was that strange leaf with the jagged pointy edges? Was it real or was it artificial?

The Church continued to fill up, and a rather huge lady came in and sat in the pew directly in front of the boy. She was wearing a red velvet dress that was stretched to its limits.

The dress was matted and thread-bare at the elbows and rear seat areas, the result of many years of wear from when she had first bought it and when she had likely been many pounds lighter.

The Service began, and the congregation was asked to stand and bow their heads in prayer. The boy stood and was now just inches from the pew's decoration. Curiosity got the better of the boy and here was his chance. With Granny's head bowed and her eyes closed, the boy reached up to feel the (stiff plastic) holly leaf.

He had barely touched it when it dislodged from the cluster on the pew's armrest, and noiselessly fell directly onto the seat from where the huge lady had just risen. What should he do? Before he could figure out how to fetch the decoration and put it back in place with the other parts, he heard everyone saying, "Amen." and the Pastor telling the Congregation they could be seated. Everyone sat down, including the lady ahead of the boy.

Two words suddenly resounded throughout the Church, echoing loudly off the arched wood-stained ceiling and resonating throughout the entire building. Now, while the first word, "Holy", was often heard in Church, the word that followed it was rarely heard there.

The boy was quickly whisked home from the Church Service.

Epilogue: I do not recall any mention of whether the boy received a visit from Santa that next morning, or whether the grandparents ever went back to that little country church.

# Keep your pets safe

The leaves of poinsettias, holly, and mistletoe, if ingested, are poisonous to dogs & cats.

Chocolate, caffeine, grapes (raisins, currants), macadamia nuts, xylitol (artificial sweetener), and onions & garlic are also not good for dogs.

It's getting cooler at dusk, so the rattlers seek the warmth of the pavement. Use flashlights at night on your dog walks!

Did you know there is an **anti-venom shot** available for your pets? Considering there were two cases of dogs bitten by rattlesnakes in the Park last year, it might be worth checking out with your Vet.

#### "THERE WAS NO ROOM AT THE INN"

A "rooming" house or "boarding" house, as we well know, is a place where a person can rent a room, usually for an extended length of time.

He has a room, so he "rooms" (or stays) there He's in a boarding house, so he "boards" (or stays) there.

So, the phrase *Room and Board* means what? That he has a place to stay and.... stay?? Think about it! Doesn't that phrase "room and board" seem redundant?

Using the modern verbal meaning for the term "board", yes the phrase does seem redundant, but we must remember that words change meanings over time. *Computer*, for example, originally referred to the person who was using the computing machine but now means the device itself. The phrase "room and board" goes back a long way – back to Medieval times when only royalty had such a thing as a dining table. In humble dwellings, the dining "table" was a plain length of board. These boards were hung on the wall when not in use, and were individually perched on the diner's knees when food was served.

Over time, the word *board* came to signify not just the dining surface but the meal itself, which is when *board* then came into combination use in the phrase *room and board*.

Room and Board = Room and Meal.

It was much later again before these lodgers themselves started being called *boarders* staying in a *boarding house* as we know it today.

However, the older meaning for the phrase room and board remains in use to this day.

It also explains why, even today, an honest person – someone who keeps his hands visible at all times – is said to be *aboveboard*.

#### ....Commentary: On Policies & Respect

In an effort by the current Board to be more accountable to the members by allowing them to have more say in how their money is spent, a policy was established that requires any proposed expenditures over \$500 to be brought before the members for a vote.

This Board has also openly encouraged members to submit requests for new acquisitions or for maintenance on existing equipment. In doing so at the open mike sessions, members should understand and respect the due process and not berate the Board for following it.

Sadly, this was not done by all at the last open meeting, with an unfortunate post-result.

Speaking – and listening – to each other should be done in a non-confrontational manner. We're all adults here, all trying to do what's best for the Park. Let's remember to treat each other with respect, even when our opinions differ.

I'm happy to share my check-list with you:


- SEAL ALL CRACKS: Apply lip balm generously. Use a good moisturizing face cream before your stroll on the beach.

# ON THE DARKER SIDE

Research shows that light destroys many of the antioxidants in olive oil. Studies found olive oil stored in clear bottles under supermarket lighting lost at least 30 percent of their vitamin E and carotenoids. We see it all over the Valley: H-E-B.

We likely shop there often: H-E-B.

Now, raise your hand if y'all know exactly what the 3 initials H-E-B stand for.

...... Hmmmm, not many hands up (but then neither could I).

For the answer to that, let's first go back 111 years.

In 1905, Florence Butt opened the C. C. Butt Grocery Store in Kerrville, up in the Texas Hill County, after her husband Charles was diagnosed with tuberculosis and was unable to work any longer. She invested \$60 in the business to get it started.

[Ed. Note: That was a fair chunk of change back then. By comparison, it is the equivalent of approximately \$2.2 Million in 2016 money]

In the early 1920's, her youngest son took over the business, and expanded it with two new stores. His name was Howard Edward Butt, hence the initials H-E-B. So, now you know.

#### Did you also know:

In 1940, he opened their first air-conditioned store and began stocking frozen food.

In 1954, their first supermarket was opened, which consolidated a fish market, butcher shop, pharmacy, and bakery all under one roof.

A grandson of Florence, also called Charles, first helped out in his grandmother's store when he was only eight. As a young adult, Charles became an Evangelist travelling around with Billy Graham (often preaching at the First Baptist Church in Dallas). He became CEO of the H-E-B food business in 1971. Now at 78 years of age, he is currently the company's major shareholder

In 2004, the H-E-B-PLUS concept was introduced, adding electronics, clothing, and gardening departments into the food mix.

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Today, 111 years after Florence first opened the doors to serve the public, H-E-B is now the largest independently-owned food chain in the United States, with 378 stores (52 of which are in Mexico), 76,000 employees, and annual sales of \$15 billion,

As you can see, Flo's "young'uns done good" for themselves!

# Other interesting H-E-B factoids:

- H-E-B operates the largest milk plant in Texas, opened in San Antonio in 1976.
- H-E-B opened a HUGE regional dry-grocery warehouse facility in Weslaco in 2007 to serve the Rio Grande Valley.
- H-E-B's fully-automated bakery in Houston opened in 2004, and it produces 153 loaves and 750 buns per minute. (Yes, every MINUTE!)
- H-E-B donates 5% of their pre-tax profits to charities. They donate 30 million pounds of food to food banks across the State each year, and prepare a quarter-million free hot meals at Thanksgiving and Christmas for the needy in over 30 different counties throughout Texas and Mexico,
- H-E-B hosts the Excellence in Education
   Awards Celebration each year, awarding
   nearly one million dollars to outstanding
   Educators in honor of their dedication to
   furthering their studies to improve themselves
   and hence improve their impact on their
   classroom students.
