A WORD (or two) TO RENTERS

HVR is a 55+ senior housing community and is legally required to maintain accurate records regarding ages of both its lot owners and its "temporary" residents (renters).

It has <u>always</u> been the Park's policy that renters can avail themselves of **every** facility and activity the Park has to offer (except, of course, you cannot attend and vote at membership meetings). This includes your being allowed to use the swimming pool, exercise room, pool hall, activity hall and clubhouse. The Landlord of your rented lot paid its HOA fees for that privilege.

If it's your first time in our Park, we hope it will not be your last. Many current owners started out as renters just like you. They liked the Park, and bought a place here. Maybe you will, too.

KEEP YOUR PETS SAFE

(In case you missed it....)

There have been warnings issued lately by both the Poison Control Agencies and Vets about the possible dangers to pets by our use of popular plug-in air freshener and other diffuser devices. It seems that the fumes emitted by certain essential oils used in their fragrances are very toxic to pets, especially when the dogs breathe these scents into their lungs.

Tea tree oil was especially singled out as a popular (but very toxic) fragrance.

Not all fragrances are harmful, but here is a list of those which adversely affect pets:

Note: The latin names are provided when checking the active ingredients in your selection. Let's face it, producers are going to disguise some of those unappealing names like goosefoot or mugwort with more alluring names like "winter holidays" or 'breezy sunshine" or some such thing. Be sure to read the fine print on the package for the active ingredient(s).

Anise (pimpinella anisum) Birch (betula) Bitter Almond (prunus dulcis) Boldo (peumus boldus) Camphor (cinnamonum camphora) Calamus (acorus) Cassia (cassia fistula) Chenopodium (chenopodium album) Cloves (syzygium aromaticum) Garlic (allium sativum) Goosefoot (chenopodium murale) Hyssop (hysspous) Horseradish (armoracia rusticana) Juniper (juniperus) Mugwort (Artemisia vulgaris) Mustard (brassica juncea) Oregano (origanum vulgare) Pennyroyal (menthe pulegium) Red or white thyme Rue (ruta graveolens) Santolina (chamaecyparissus) Sassafras (albidum) Savory (satureja) Tansy (tanacetum vulgare) Tea tree oil (melaleuca alternifolia) Thuja (occidentalis) Terebinth (pistacia palaestina) Wintergreen (gaultheria procumbens) Wormwood (Artemisia absinthium) Yarrow (achillea millefolium)



Did you know....The first reported planting of a grapefruit tree grove in Texas was in 1893. In 1914, John H. Shary, a developer originally from Omaha Nebraska, bought 16 thousand acres of brush land and after clearing it, proceeded to grow his first crop of seeded white grapefruit. Impressed by the small crop raised by early citrus experimentation, Shary was convinced that citrus was the crop of the future for South Texas. The first commercial shipment of citrus left the Lower Rio Grande Valley in 1920.

In 1929 an accidental discovery of red grapefruit growing on a pink grapefruit tree gave rise to the Texas Red Grapefruit Industry.

With that discovery, the Texas citrus industry really took off, leading to a peak of more than 100,000 acres in the 1940s. Moreover, Texas' reputation for quality red grapefruit production was established by the varieties which originated within the Valley.

However, freezes of the late 1940s, 1951, 1962, 1983, and 1989 took their toll on the trees. As well, spreading urbanization and the overall citrus economic decline have lowered the citrus acreage to an estimated 28,000 acres by 2018.

Texas Grapefruit Frozen Yogurt

(Recipe compliments of Lone Star Citrus Growers).

This is surprisingly sweet with a hint of zing! (serves 8, if you're willing to share)

4 grapefruit (about 4 cups)
2 (6 oz) containers Greek yogurt

1/3 to 1/2 cup sweetener

Section the grapefruit and place on a sheet pan. Cover and freeze for at least 30 minutes.

Combine frozen grapefruit sections, yogurt, and sweetener in a food processor and process 30 seconds or until smooth and creamy.

Scoop into bowls and freeze until ready to serve.

HVR RECYCLING PROGRAM

Tues & Thurs 8:00 – 9:30 am

No one could have imagined when this program was started three seasons ago, just how hugely successful it would become!

The purchase of a second and larger trailer has been approved by the membership to handle the overwhelming increase in volume from everyone's recycling efforts.

It makes sense to recycle, and not just because you're helping the planet, but you as an individual are financially rewarding yourself.

How? If you're one of the many recyclers, you know you are saving the use of at least one or more garbage bags every week. Even at a low estimate of 25 bags saved per season, that's over \$50 in savings to you by not having to purchase those brown garbage bags. You've saved at least \$150 in the last three years alone!

Going forward for the next three Seasons. 280 HVR households who recycle will collectively "save" more money on garbage bags than the initial purchase cost of the new trailer!

As they say in Nuevo Progreso, that makes the new trailer, "Almost Free! Almost Free!"

Things accepted:

Aluminum beverage cans (we remove the tabs for Shriners before we put them in the HVR chute.) Cardboard & Newspaper

(The above 3 items provides income)

Other paper

Plastic (squashed, to save space)

Glass bottles (rinsed)

Tin cans (rinsed out and with labels removed)

Things NOT recyclable in this area:

Styrofoam (including styrofoam egg cartons)

Although Scrap Metal is recyclable, our volunteers are not equipped to handle that stuff. Thank you for your understanding in not bringing it to us. (Put it curbside. It'll disappear quite quickly.)

Volunteers with a truck & hitch are needed on a rotational schedule to take the trailers to the McAllen Recycle Center. You would be covered by our Park Insurance*

* Our insurance requires a maximum of 10 drivers, and must have their names, DOBs, & copies of their driver's licenses on file. Age restriction also applies.

- When you're backing out near the Clubhouse main doors, be sure to look all three ways: left, right, and <u>behind</u> you (for traffic coming up Long Dr).

CHLORINE IN A SALT POOL?

Our pool was switched over to a salt water purification system in 2015 to REDUCE the amount of chlorine being used. However, we cannot completely eliminate chlorine, as salt water alone will not kill algae. You only have to look at the green slime on the keels of ships to know that algae can thrive even in salt water.

Since the switchover, there is now a great deal less chlorine required, but we still need <u>some</u> chlorine to prevent algae buildup.

The hot tub, however, is still chlorine-only. Because of the separate piping to the hot tub and its relatively small size, the Board could not justify the costs to install its own salt water system.

Volunteers monitor and record the chlorine and algae levels daily. **Offer to help out** for ten minutes one day a week!
